

God's Grief Over Human Sin

The biblical writer emphasizes that the earth had become filled with violence. This word suggests widespread conflict, oppression, and injustice. Communities were no longer governed by fairness or compassion, and human relationships had become destructive.

This passage reminds readers that sin is not only a moral mistake but also something that damages the relationship between humanity and God. The grief described in Genesis reflects the brokenness that occurs when people reject the path of wisdom and righteousness.

Yet even within this sorrowful moment, the story does not end in despair. God begins to establish a path toward restoration by choosing Noah and preparing a way for life to continue beyond the coming judgment.
